A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

It has been a busy start to the year, one where we have enrolled seven new students and received two letters from the Minister of Education, Hon Chris Hipkins!

The first letter referred to the fantastic ERO report we received in January. His letter stated:

'I have been informed by the Chief Review Officer that Halswell Residential College has recently been reviewed by the Education Review Office and that the review report has been confirmed with the decision that ERO will next review the school in four to five years... I congratulate all involved in the work you are doing to ensure your school is providing a high quality of education for its learners.... In particular, I note the positive impact the school is having responding to children whose learning and achievement need acceleration.'

Please take time to read our ERO report. I hope it gives you confidence in the quality education your child is receiving while at HRC.

The second letter from Hon Chris Hipkins thanked staff for the courage, professionalism and compassion they displayed in the face of tragic events during the lockdown when the act of terrorism took place in Christchurch. Staff were very proud of the resilience students demonstrated at this time too.

At the beginning of each year we like to undertake an anonymous staff survey. There is a saying that 'culture eats strategy for breakfast' and we are aware that a strong culture equates to positive and engaged staff. Engaged staff are more likely to engage students. Unengaged students don't learn, so the better the staff culture the better for your child. This is what respondents told us this year:

- 97.5% positively care about the future of HRC (an increase from 96% in 2018).
- 100% are proud to tell others they work at HRC (same result in 2018).
- 97.5% feel HRC inspires them to do their best (an increase from 91% in 2018).
- 100% feel they are willing to put in a great deal of time and effort beyond what is normally expected (an increase from 94% in 2018).

It has been a great term in Kawatea. Dominique and Jordie, who were with us last term, have remained members of Kawatea. Early in the term we welcomed Jullian, and we end the term welcoming Hunter to the class. At the end of term assembly we will farewell Dominique as she heads back home to Greymouth.

This term we have been learning about Te Tiriti o Waitangi. We found a great series called 'Treaty of Waitangi, What Really Happened' that we have watched. It has also generated lots of discussion in class.

Our tamariki love being outdoors, and we have managed to visit the Halswell Quarry a few times this term. There are tracks that lead around the old quarry which we have walked, and lovely gardens and open spaces to explore. A particular highlight for all has been meeting the various dogs that are taken for walks at the quarry. Most owners have been very willing to allow us to pat and play with their dogs, which our students have loved.

I am particularly interested in providing a play-based approach to learning for our students at times during the school day. There are so many skills that tamariki learn with this approach, and the skills are particularly useful to the Halswell College students. We have watched as the students engage in fantasy play (dress ups), construction (Lego), messy play (play dough, shaving foam and food colouring), and enclosure play (hut making). Many of the skills they are practising involve social interactions such as turn taking, negotiation, using manners and basic communication. Matua Denis and I have observed as Dominique, Jullian

and Jordie have resolved minor conflicts themselves and remained engaged in their shared activity. As the term is coming to an end, I have begun to look at outdoor spaces to develop as part of a play-based approach. Being outdoors adds an amazing dynamic to children's learning experiences as they practise problem solving and team work skills. Jullian has already begun by burying some treasure in an area of the school and drawing a map of where it is hidden.

Matua Denis and I would like to wish Dominique and her whanau all the best for her transition home. We will miss you, Dominique.
